

To follow is a recap of the three waves as well as the tabulations for the most recent survey. Readers should note that the n values increase each wave as the percentage of undecided voters drops over time and that the margin of accuracy for sub-samples is wider than the aggregate city sample. The research is based on a random telephone sample of 1,000 very likely Toronto voters conducted between October 14th and 16th, 2010 by Nanos Research and is accurate 3.1 percentage points, plus or minus, 19 times out of 20. Anatomy of the Toronto Mayor's Race

- The Issues Over the course of the campaign, voter concern over taxes and transportation has increased.
- **Undecided Voters** The percentage of undecided one week away from the election has dropped to 18.5% of very likely municipal voters.
- **Volatility** In terms of volatility, among undecided voters (n=185) 28.6% said they will make their decision on election day and another 13.0% indicated they would make their final decision in the voting booth.
- Anti-Ford Movement has Coalesced around Smitherman Support for Rob Ford (43.9%) is consistent with the previous wave, however, with the dropping out of the race of Sara Thomson and Rocco Rossi, the anti-Ford forces have coalesced around George Smitherman whose support has increased to 40.5% of decided voters. Factoring the margin of accuracy for the sample of decided voters of 3.5 percentage points, plus or minus, 19 times out of 20 (n=815), the race is a statistical dead heat.
- **Geographic Base of Support** Ford has the advantage in Etobicoke and Smitherman the advantage in Old Toronto.
- **Structure of Race** With Ford support relatively unchanged in the past 30 days, the change in the structure of the race has worked to the primary benefit of Smitherman.
- **Pantalone Support Flat** Support for Pantalone has not changed as candidates have dropped out of the race for mayor. His support stands at 15.0% of decided voters.
- **Smitherman-Pantalone Overlap** There is significant overlap between Smitherman and Pantalone supporters, one half of the supporters of each campaign identify the other as their second choice.
- Ford/Smitherman Support Firm Pantalone Support not as Firm In terms of the firmness of support, supporters for Rob Ford and Smitherman are relatively firm (two thirds, or more, of supporters in both camps rated their firmness a 4 out of 4 on a 4-point scale where 4 was firm and 1 was not firm). Only 47.5% of Pantalone supporters indicated they were firm which suggests they are accessible to other camps, with the most likely beneficiary being the Smitherman campaign.
- Ford Supporters driven by Change & Vision Smitherman supporters driven by Experience and Vision Ford supporters are more likely to be driven by the desire to send a message of change (43.3%) and vision (32.4%) while only 10.0% of Smitherman voters are driven by the change message. Smitherman supporters are more likely to be driven by the view he is the most qualified (47.6%) or has the best vision (33.9%).
- Ford has advantage on Trust Smitherman still trails Ford in terms of the candidate considered the most trustworthy (Ford 34.4%, Smitherman 23.1%). Almost one of four Torontonians (23.6%) were unsure which of the candidates for mayor was the most trustworthy.
- **Ford has advantage on Managing Tax Dollars** Ford has the advantage over Smitherman in terms of the public view as to who can best manage tax dollars (Ford 39.5% compared to Smitherman 24.4%).
- Subways and Roads dominate priorities in terms of Transportation In terms of transportation dollar priorities, for every dollar spent, likely municipal voters would give 31.1 cents to the subway, 30.2 cents to roads, 16.6 cents to LRT/Streetcar, 11.9 cents to sidewalks and 10.0 cents to bike lanes.




• Noticeable division between Ford and Non-Ford supporters on raising taxes to improve city services - A majority of likely municipal voters are not willing to pay more in city taxes to improve city services. Of note, this is a key driver for Ford supporters, while supporters of Smitherman are comparatively more open to paying more in city taxes to improve city services.


Comparison of Decided and Undecided Likely Municipal Voters






Ballot - Aggregate All Likely Municipal Voters in City of Toronto




Ballot - Etobicoke Sub-sample

Ballot - North York Sub-sample




Ballot - Scarborough Sub-sample

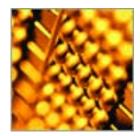

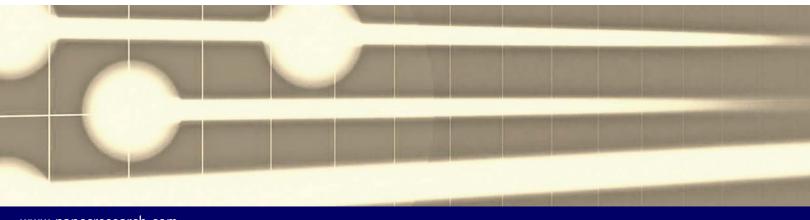
